Year 6 Term 1 2024/25

We hope you had an incredible Summer filled with adventure and quality time with family. We are eager to kick off an exciting term of learning! Below is an overview of what we'll be covering up to the half-term break. If you have any questions, feel free to reach out to any member of the SLT or speak to your child's teacher at the end of the school day.

A few reminders as we start the new year:

English

In English this term, we will be looking a variety of styles of writing. Our fiction-



based unit will focus around the tale of Hansel and Gretel- but with a darker twist! We will be learning to use synonyms, antonyms and semi-colons to up level our writing. Later in the term, we will also explore different styles of poetry as well as biographies in our non-fiction unit.

Maths

In Maths this term we will begin by developing our understanding of place value- working with numbers up to 10,000,000. We will also consolidate our learning of rounding numbers and exploring negative numbers. Later in the term, we will turn our attention to addition, (0) (0) (H) (H) (Tens (T)

At the end of this newsletter, we have attached some question prompts you might want to use when you read with your child. Topic Subjects

Our Foundation Subject Topic this term is 'Roman Invasion and Legacy'. This is an extremely exciting topic where we will be learning about successful and unsuccessful invasions made on Britain by the Romans and explore the reasons why they wanted to do so. We will also be learning about how wellorganised their armies were and key figures at that time as well as learning about the impact the Roman Empire had on Britain. We will also explore the legacy of their invasion including the introduction of Roman roads, the structure of towns and their names. Later in the term, we will be studying the artist Kehinde Wiley- learning about and mimicking his art style.

Please find below some of the key facts that your child will learn. We will use these facts in our quick recall quizzes and we will be referring back to them over the term. Ask your child about these questions at home to help them remember the knowledge!

- The Romans introduced many things that are still present in modern-day Britain (such as Roman roads)
- Julius Caesar was a Roman emperor
- Roman emperors invaded Britain multiple times, both successfully and unsuccessfully
- They wanted more resources, power and land from Britain



Your child will have P.E. on **Wednesdays and Fridays.** We ask that they come to school wearing their P.E. kit on these days. This should include a gold P.E. top, black shorts or black jogging bottoms, and white or black

Spelling	 Home learning Expectations Home Reading – Please ensure your child reads at least 5 times a week at home. Please prioritise this as this is proven to be the most impactful for children and their learning in school. Maths –Times Table Rock Stars practise (Years 2 to 6) – a total of at least 20 minutes on 'Garage mode'. Spellings – Please practise the weekly spellings at home to support the learning in school (Years 1-6) - around 15 minutes in total. Please ensure you record evidence of your home learning in your home learning books so that you receive your 'Home Learning Hero' time!
	We also ask that you read at least 5 times a week to develop your comprehension and fluency. In the coming weeks, we will be giving out login details for children to use on 'Purple Mash'. This is an online platform for those children who wish to practise their English and Maths even more at home! ©

Question Prompts to use when reading with your child

The Book Introduction

Relate the story to the children's own experience (fiction) Tap into the children's prior knowledge of the subject (non-fiction) Very brief overview of the story without revealing too much Look at front cover and encourage prediction - Who? Where? What? Look at back cover and blurb Look at illustrations

Recall Questions

Where does the story take place? When did the story take place? What did he/she look like? Who was he/she? Where did he/she live? Who are the characters in the book? Where in the book would you find ...?

Simple Comprehension Questions

What do you think is happening here? What happened in the story? What might this mean? Through whose eyes is the story told? Which part of the story best describes the setting? What words and/or phrases do this? What part of the story do you like best?

Investigative Questions

What makes you think that? What words give you that impression?
