<u>Writing</u>


Please, please, please keep up with the daily sentence writing in your diaries everyone as this is one of the most important things you can keep on top of at home.

Remember to use your phoneme fingers. It doesn't matter if you are not spelling the words right — just use the sounds that you have been taught. This is perfectly acceptable:

Also, remember to hold your pencil in the 'froggy finger' grip.



- 1. Put two frog legs about 3cm above the cone shaped part of the pencil.
- 2. Let the pencil lie across the frog's back.
- 3. Then put the log under the frog.

Chloe has been working through a maths book which mummy and daddy bought her.






Jemima has found different ways to make 20 using duplo and then she has been sorting 3d shapes in her home.

We have also found some word lists similar to the ones we give you in your reading record books each week.


If you go onto Purplemash and click on 'English', 'Phonics' and then choose Phase 3 sounds or Phase 3 words, you can practise what we have been learning in class.
